Composer and Guest Conductor: John Pasternak has composed for and directed community ensembles throughout the Northeast Ohio area since 2003. His Bachelor's Degree in Music Education is from Kent State University (KSU) where he served as President of their Ohio Collegiate Music Education Association (OCMEA) Chapter. In 2008 John was elected as a member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP). Pasternak's experience includes composing and conducting works with and for KSU ensembles. He completed a film score for an independent KSU film Breaking News and in 2012, he completed his film score for Research: The Musical. John worked with Hudson author Tish Dahlby for an audio book score for the birthday celebration book Pinkleiinx. Recently, John scored music for an Audio Technica promotional video How to Mic a Zombie. An active composer, his recent band compositions are published by RWS Music Company. John recently completed his JFK Symphony which is based on speeches given by President John F. Kennedy. The Western Reserve Community Band members requested Pasternak to conduct his JFK Symphony on our Spring Concert. Currently, he is a freelance composer for hire and looking for his next teaching position.

Narrator: Hudson resident William Monro is a retired Steel Product Manager for MTD Products headquartered in Valley City, Ohio. Near the end of his working career and into his retirement. Bill offered his services as a voice over talent for MTD and other commercial endeavors. He is a proud Navy veteran submariner having served aboard the Fleet Ballistic Missile Submarine USS Sam Houston.

PROGRAM NOTES

An American Fanfare: The melody used is My Country Tis of Thee also known simply as America. This American patriotic song was penned by Samuel Francis Smith. In 1831 a friend asked Smith to translate the lyrics of a song in a German school songbook. Rather than translate the German text, Smith wrote his own lyrics to a melody by Muzio Clementi. Smith had no knowledge, at the time, of the association of the tune to the British national anthem. Composer Kirby has taken this normally hymn-like and stately melody and incorporated it into a fast, hard driving fanfare.

A Jefferson Portrait: This original composition was inspired by Jefferson's contributions to America and the world, his love of music, as well to Jefferson's private side, which offers a story of great personal challenges balancing extraordinary outward accomplishments. This patriotic setting for concert band with narrator uses The Declaration Of Independence in a musical context that captures the contribution of Thomas Jefferson's immortal words. Patriotic by nature, yet contemporary in musical construction, this work by Elliot Del Borgo is an outstanding addition to our patriotic concert band repertoire.

Variations on America: This remarkable set, composed for organ when Charles Ives was about 18. Ives later described it as "but a boy's work, partly serious and partly in fun." These variations serve, however, as perhaps the most comprehensive illustration of Ives's youthful sweep of style. After a snappy figural variation, we hear a sinuous barbershop setting, a jaunty European cavalry march, a "midway" polonaise, and a scherzo. These variations show his already prodigious ability as a composer. The requisitely virtuosic finale, includes the telltale cross-rhythm of ragtime.

Lincoln Portrait: Soon after the United States entered World War II, André Kostelanetz, conductor of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, asked three American composers (Virgil Thomson, Jerome Kern, Aaron Copland) to write works that would convey "the magnificent spirit of our country." Copland initially planned to honor Walt Whitman but became persuaded that a political figure of world stature would be better suited to the patriotic purpose. Copland wrote: "The letters and speeches of Lincoln supplied the text. The order and arrangement of the selections are my own. The composition is roughly divided into three main sections. In the opening section, I wanted to suggest something of the mysterious sense of fatality that surrounds Lincoln's personality. Also, near the end of that section, something of his greatness and simplicity of spirit. (Springfield Mountain is the thematic basis of this portion.) The guick middle section briefly sketches in the background of the times during which he lived. This section includes bits of Stephen Foster's Camptown Races which, when used by Lincoln supporters during his Presidential campaign of 1860, was sung to the words, "We're bound to work all night, bound to work all day. I'll bet my money on the Lincoln hoss...' This merges into the concluding section, where my sole purpose was to draw a simple but impressive frame around the words of Lincoln." The narration, which occurs only in the third section. Copland used Lincoln's words, adding his own brief descriptions of the former president.

The Liberty Bell: For \$500 more, this march probably would have been named The Devil's Deputy. Sousa was composing music for an operetta of that name at the request of the famous comedian Francis Wilson. Sousa asked \$1500 for the work, but Wilson offered \$1000. When they could not come to an agreement, Sousa withdrew his partially completed manuscript, which included a lively march. Sousa and George Frederick Hinton, one of the band's managers, were in Chicago witnessing a spectacle called America when a backdrop, with a huge painting of the Liberty Bell, was lowered. Hinton suggested that The Liberty Bell would be a good title for Sousa's new march. By coincidence, the next morning Sousa received a letter from his wife in which she told him that their son had marched in his first parade in Philadelphia, a parade honoring the return of the Liberty Bell. which had been on tour. The new march was then christened The Liberty Bell. It was one of the first marches Sousa sold to the John Church Company and was the first composition to bring Sousa a substantial financial reward.

JFK Symphony: A symphony with 5 movements. Each movement based upon the words from a specific speech that John F, Kennedy gave over the course of his presidency. I. Let the word go forth... Inaugural Address, 20 January 1961; II. We choose to go to the moon...Rice University, 12 September 1962; III. This nation is opposed to war. Report to the American People on the Soviet Arms Buildup in Cuba, 22 October 1962, IV. What kind of peace do I mean? Commencement Address at American University, 10 June 1963; V. I look forward to an America... Remarks at Amherst College, 26 October 1963.

Suite from Hamilton: Hamilton is a musical about the life of American Founding Father Alexander Hamilton, with music, lyrics, and book by Lin -Manuel Miranda and others. In 2016, it was nominated for a record-setting 16 Tony Awards®, winning 11 (including Best Musical), and was also the recipient of the 2016 GRAMMY® Award for Best Musical Theater Album and the 2016 Pulitzer Prize for Drama. Jerry Brubaker has chosen six of the most musical selections from the Broadway show to use in this arrangement to experience the beauty and excitement of this amazing musical!

A Bernstein Tribute: Leonard Bernstein was an iconic American musician who achieved fame as a pianist, composer, educator and conductor. His compositions include an opera, ballets, masses, jazz, concertos, musicals, movie music and symphonies. This tribute creates a musical bouquet for our 20th century legend. It offers listeners the opportunity to enter the world of Bernstein through some of his most notable compositions. Clare Grundman has captured the spirit of each work in his adaptation which includes excerpts from the following Broadway musicals: Symphonic Dances from West Side Story. Three Dance Episodes from On the Town and Excerpts from Overture to Candide.
